December 31, 1956 - November 7, 2017

David "Dave" Powers, loved, adored and admired by many suddenly passed away in the early evening on Tuesday, November 7, 2017. Dave radiated family, loyalty, generosity, determination, and his beloved Bishop Moore Hornets.

Dave ventured on five wonderfully successful community-banking endeavors in Central Florida serving as President and CEO of his beloved United Group as well as consistently giving of his time and his talent. David whole-heartedly served on the Catholic School Board for the Diocese of Orlando, as well as the director of the Orlando Chapter of the University of Florida Foundation, the Ronald McDonald Foundation, the Florida Hospital Foundation, and as the Chairman of the Board of Trustees at Bishop Moore Catholic High School. Dave was also a recipient of the Papal Cross, which was awarded to him by the Vatican for his dedication in community service.

Dave found his 'home' in the early seventies as a student at Bishop Moore Catholic High School. He was an extremely avid member of the school band and after graduating in May of 1974, prided himself on having only missed two of Bishop Moore's football games in the last 43 years. Through Dave's love of music, he was able to single-handedly keep the band and beat alive at Bishop Moore and continued to joyously march with his snare drum strapped on, at each and every annual Homecoming football game. He is credited with bringing the College Park community together by reestablishing the rivalry between Bishop Moore and it's neighborhood rival, Edgewater High School with "The Battle of College Park" which gathers hundreds of fans together every year for a tremendous football game – Bishop Moore has defeated Edgewater since it has begun, and Dave could not have been more proud of his alma mater. Bishop Moore Catholic High School was a true testament to Dave.

Dave was as humble of a man as he was a great one. He believed every single person he encountered went before him always. He enjoyed, valued and loved every minute of his life. Dave instilled the same qualities in his four children and of all of his accomplishments they were his greatest. His legacy will continue to live on through them.

Dave is survived by his wife Aida, his children, Amanda, Allison, Angela, and David II; stepchildren, Destiny and Antonio Ellenwood; granddaughter, Alyssa; parents Gene and Judith Powers; sister Angela (Bob) Ward and their six children.

I am truly shocked, and I have learned so much in the past 15 minutes as I read the above comments. I first met Dave in 1984 when I decided to start a new manufacturing business in Longwood. Quite by random, I chose to walk into Freedom Bank on Hwy. 434 to see someone about opening a small business account. Dave was a young manager there, and I didn't know what to expect since my experience was in service businesses, and I had

never been involved with manufacturing. David immediately made me feel very comfortable, and our negotiations were very easy. Back then, \$100,000 was still a lot of money, and when I asked for a \$100,000 line of credit, he didn't look shocked, or ask a lot of quick questions. He just asked me about the business I wanted to start. It happened to be a specialty vehicle manufacturing business, which interested him immediately. He asked me how much money we had to raise for the start-up, and I told him none. I said, "if I open a small business account, and deposit \$75,000 in it, and sign as personal guaranter, can I get the line of credit I want so we can floor plan the vehicles we will be building?" He smiled warmly, and said, "That's a very admirable thing to do. You must trust your partners a lot". I told him that I had not known them for long, but they were the two best innovative engineers in the industry, and could build anything on wheels that you could possibly want. I then told him that my first two customers were Bill Kennedy, the founder of Rotech, Inc., and the owners of Full Sail, both of which were hardly known then, but are both very successful companies now. He asked about our marketing plan, and I said I was it. He said, Mr. Hudson, I think you will do very well, and I will be glad to help you with whatever banking business you need.

What I am shocked about is first, since I have not talked to Dave in a few years, I had no idea he was gone. I just happened to be thinking about business and banking in general, and decided to Google him to see what he was up to lately. The second thing that shocked me was to learn more about his personal life, because he and I only knew each other through business and banking. My son was a musician and played in the marching band at Lake Mary High School, then at UCF, where he majored in music education, and who is now band leader and music teacher at a Catholic School, and who is married to a girl who was in the marching band at Bishop Moore. Now I wish that I had spent more time talking about personal things with Dave. He helped me get my start as an entrepreneur, and since I first met him and negotiated my first business banking deal with him, I have gone on to do 8 startups over the years, and none of the rest have been in manuufacturing, but I'll always remember the great feeling I had with my first banking experience with David Powers, the manager of Freedom Bank in Longwood. It was a great experience at that stage of my business development. RIP, David.
