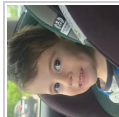

Of all the "high level" and stimulating conversations we engaged in over the years about the world scene (past and present) , I would have to say without a doubt, none were more interesting and provocative than our lively discussions about our favorite topic...the soap operas. Since Diane was so passionate about the soaps, it would be amiss not to at least give them a mention.

Diane had a long history with the soap operas...60 years to be exact when she first listened to them on the radio with her mother. She never lost interest in the trials and tribulations of those glamorous but flawed characters living in fabulous homes in fictional places, holding jobs they were not qualified for, and experiencing adventures that could only exist in a writer's imagination. As for me, I never even thought about the "soaps" until I was between jobs for a short time during the 80's when I started watching "As the World Turns", which just happened to be one of Diane's favorites. This curiosity about the extraordinary worlds of the denizens of Young and the Restless in Genoa City and Bold and the Beautiful in LA glued us together and officially deemed us as "soap sisters".

Our last conversation was the Monday before New Year's Eve. Diane sounded so good and her voice was stronger than it had been the week prior. We didn't know, of course, that call would be the last time we would speak to each other but what I will remember about those 60 minutes is how we laughed so hard we couldn't breathe. What was so funny? Taking the various soap characters

and plugging them into our own version of Gone with the Wind. It was hilarious and what a gift those moments were to remember Diane that way ...quick to laugh, quick to listen, quick to bring out the best of me. My world was made a little bit richer, a little more exciting just by her being in it. I will miss her so and am grateful to have had someone on the other end of the telephone line I could just be myself with.

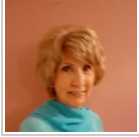
