“ Thank you to all who attended my Dad's funeral earlier this week! If you were not able to be there, I hope you will enjoy his eulogy:

A Eulogy for William Kelly Fahey, Sr.

God has called my Dad home. If she has a sense of humor, that call sounded like Ella Fitzgerald singing: “Won’t you come home, Bill Fahey, ... won’t you come home?” Wonderful music to my Dad’s ears. Another song and dance.

Dad was a lover. He wedded Pearl Hofer 67 years ago. Their marriage was the typical union of a Leprechaun and a beautiful Teutonic battle maiden: Magic, fireworks, and drama: Blessed by 7 children; 27 grandchildren; and 9 (soon to be 10) great-grandchildren.

Dad was Irish. He rode the Irish diaspora, relocating far from his birthplace and close relatives. Growing up in Cleveland and Oakland, California, and wedding Pearl in 1951. Then, for two decades, Dad serially relocated our growing family through Northern and Southern California, Hawaii and Wisconsin, finally settling in Longwood, Florida in 1974.

Dad was a family man. His descendants live in several states and 2 foreign countries. He was happiest when he could be with family, and grieved that he could not live close to all his family. But he was blessed to have more than 20 close family members living just a few miles away, and many at his bedside when he departed this Earth.

Dad was an extrovert. He drew energy from simple everyday interactions. His restaurant server, nurse or barber could tell he cared. He knew everyone’s name. If you were fortunate enough to be sitting near him in a public place, you became his friend—you had no choice!

Dad was strong. A genuine United States Marine. A titan of industry,

with opinions that mattered to the brass at Tupperware International. A trusted advisor, on whom you could always depend. He was a patriarch with a kind and steady hand.

Dad was an amazing storyteller. I will forever treasure the year I lived with my Dad's mother, Grandma Lib, who would often embellish a wonderful telling of a story with, "and to make a long story longer." I know she inspired him to be the compelling storyteller he was, a true magician and raconteur.

Dad was a generous provider. Looking back, although we were far from rich, I never lacked any material needs. In the early 1960s, my Dad framed a magazine ad on his garage workbench that read: "Dad, can I have \$10,000 for college?" Sounds crazy today, when that won't even buy a semester, but I always knew my Dad would help me reach for the stars, if I was willing.

Dad was wise. As a college undergraduate, I couldn't decide what I wanted to be when I grew up. I drifted from one major to another, with good grades in mostly everything but no passion. When I told Dad I wanted to be a lawyer, he said there were already TOO MANY lawyers. But when I told him there were not enough GOOD lawyers, he smiled.

Dad was a leader. He was a founding member of this beautiful church, and worked tirelessly over the years to raise money to help it thrive. He led his neighborhood as the honorary mayor of Sweetwater Oaks, making sure that the grounds looked their best. He was a major force in his Rotary Club, throwing his whole self into all their activities and good works. Everything he touched, he made better.

Dad was a true friend. From his family, to his co-workers, to the "lovable legends of Longwood Starbucks," to the guy sitting next to him on the plane. He always reached out to others and met them more than half-way. I'm not surprised that his friendship touched the lives of every person in this huge church. That's the kind of guy he

was. His heart was big enough for all of us.

I know that, like me, you will all miss my Dad. But he had a great run. He lived a full life. And he left a lasting legacy in all of us. As we say goodbye, I know that God is singing: "Bill Fahey, won't you please come home!"

I remember first meeting him while attending my very first meeting and him shaking my hand and handing me a business card identifying himself as 'The 'Mayor' of Sweetwater Oaks in Seminole County. As he mentored me on the Board during those formative years he would tell me to always remember one thing... "This position isn't about 'fining' or 'not fining' people, it's simply about gaining compliance". And to this date I try to share that same thought and philosophy as I try to emulate his humble standard.

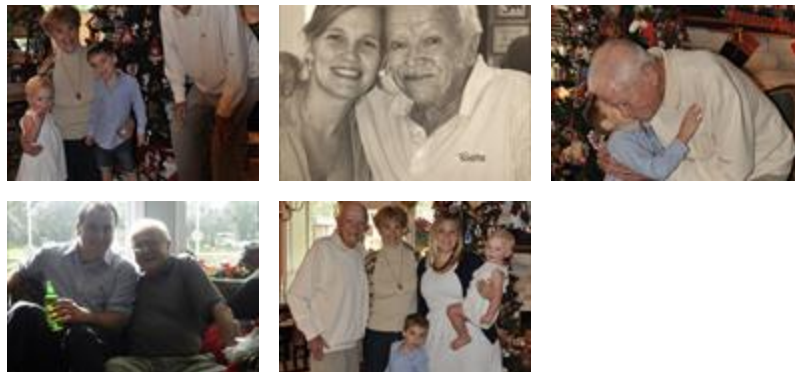
He will be truly missed. May he rest in peace.

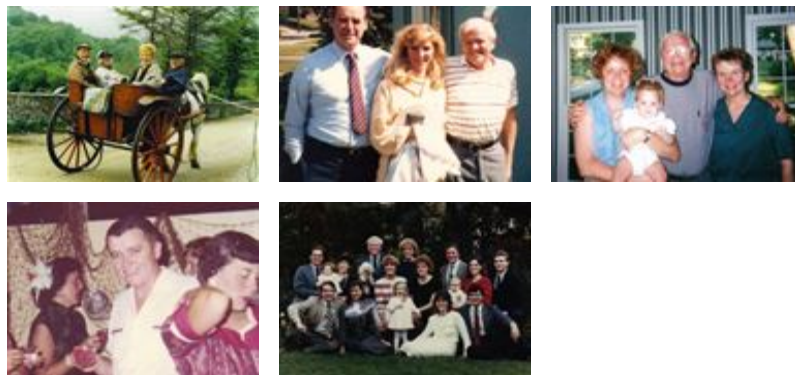
